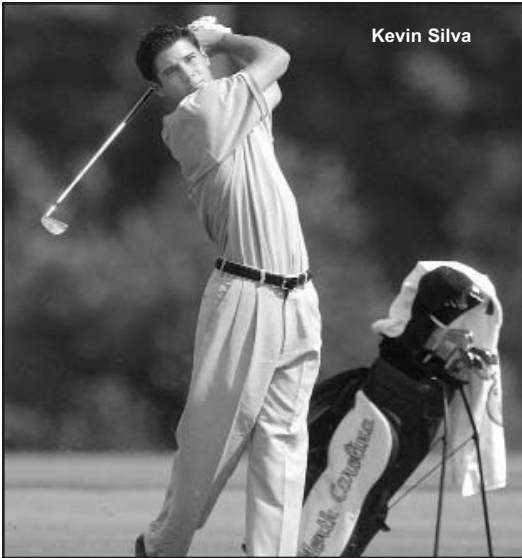

General Info: One of the top players in college golf...held down the top spot in the lineup in his first three years as a Tar Heel...selected to 2002-03 PING All-America First Team and 2001-02 PING All-America Second Team...named to the All-ACC Team in 2000-01, 2001-02 and 2002-03...2002 ACC Individual Champion...winningest Tar Heel in school history with seven victories under his belt...one of this year's team captains.

Fall '03: Played in all four of Carolina tournaments...captured two individual titles to become the winningest Tar Heel in school history with seven victories to his credit, one more than Davis Love III's six wins...tied for first place at the Franklin Street Partners Invitational and won the Duke Golf classic...tied for 20th place at the Ping/Golfweek Preview...concluded the season with a 71.91 stroke average...one of 26 college golfers selected to play in the 29th annual Western Refining Golf Classic in El Paso, Texas, where he tied for 24th place.

2002-03: Played in all 12 of Carolina's tournaments...named to 2002-03 PING All-America First Team...selected to 2002-03 All-ACC team for third consecutive year...posted seven top-10 and 10 top-20 finishes...captured three tournament titles, two in the fall and one in the spring...in the fall, he captured the individual title at The International Collegiate in St. Andrews, Scotland, and tied for individual medalist honors at The Ridges Intercollegiate...in the spring he won the Seminole Intercollegiate...tied for eighth place at the Carpet Capital Classic, Carolina's other fall event...was the runner-up at the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship, the first event of the spring campaign...tied for fifth place at the Birkdale Collegiate Classic, tied for ninth at the ACC Championship, tied for 11th at the Cleveland Golf/Augusta State Invitational, tied for 14th at the NCAA Central Regional and tied for 19th place at The Intercollegiate...one of 24 college golfers selected to play in the 28th annual Western Refining Golf Classic in El Paso, Texas, in November where he tied for sixth place...concluded the year with a 71.56 stroke average...presented the Andy Hacsckaylo Award with the team's low stroke average for the third consecutive year.

2001-02: Played in all 14 of Carolina's tournaments...named to the 2001-02 PING All-America Second Team...selected to the 2001-02 All-ACC Team...posted eight top-10 and nine top-20 finishes...captured the individual title at the ACC Championship...fired an 11-under par 205 total to stave off a pair of Georgia Tech players by two strokes for the championship...led throughout the tournament at the Old North State Club in New London, N.C., carding 14 birdies and only three bogies...tied for medalist honors at The Prestige in Palm Desert, Calif., in the fall...other top-10 finishes in the fall - tied for third place at the Mason Rudolph Championship, tied for fifth place and the Duke Golf Classic and placed 10th at the Carpet Capital Classic...other top-20 finishes in the spring - tied for fifth place at The Intercollegiate, tied for seventh at the Seminole Intercollegiate, tied for 10th place at the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship and tied for 17th at the NCAA Championship...presented the Andy Hacsckaylo Award with the team's low stroke average.

2000-01: Selected to the 2000-01 All-ACC team...played in all five of the Heels' fall tournaments...posted three top-20 finishes...tied for 10th place at the Duke Golf Classic, tied for 18th place at the Golf World/Palmetto Dunes Collegiate and tied for 19th at the Ping/Golfweek Preview...was the low Tar Heel in each of the final four tournaments of the fall campaign...played in all eight of Carolina's spring events...carded two top-10 finishes and five top-20 finishes...posted a fourth-place finish at the Seminole Intercollegiate and tied for eighth at the Cleveland Golf/ASU Invitational...tied for 11th place at the Schenkel E-Z-Go Invitational and The Intercollegiate...tied for 12th place at the Cavalier Classic and tied for 22nd at the ACC Championship and the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship...presented the Andy Hacsckaylo Award with the team's low stroke average.

Amateur: Semi-finalist at 2002 U.S. Amateur, defeating Ryan Moore, U.S. Publiclinks champion along the way...champion of 2002 Cardinal Amateur where an eagle on the 14th hole spurred his victory...posted sixth-place finish at 2002 Dogwood Invitational...played for the United States in the 2002 U.S./Japan matches at The Glen Club in Glenview, Ill., where the Americans held on for a two-point win...that marked the seventh straight victory for the Americans who lead the series 20-6...posted a fourth-place in the 2001 Eastern Amateur and finished third in the 2001 Cardinal Amateur...placed third at the AJGA Thunderbirds International Junior Amateur...top-10 finish at Eastern Amateur...AJGA First-Team All-America in 1999 and AJGA Second-Team All-America in 2000...1999 N.C. Junior Amateur champion.

Up Close with Dustin

How did you get started playing golf? "I first started playing when I was four years old. My father would take me to the local high school practice football field and would allow me to run around and hit 15-20 old golf balls for as long as I wanted. I believe I first started playing actual holes when I was five." **What do you think about the spring season for yourself and the team?** "It's going to be an interesting spring. As a team we have the potential to beat anyone, but we must first mature as a program and put in the amount of work necessary to be successful. For myself, I want to ready myself for the future and find myself continuing to improve." **What is your role on the team this year as a senior?** "To enjoy every day of my final year, to leave this program feeling as though I have helped improve it and to give my teammates 110 percent of what I have to offer as a person and as a player." **How do you think your game has grown while playing at UNC - what have you learned?** "My main goal coming into college was to mature and enable myself the best opportunities to continue playing golf once I left. I would like to feel as though I have matured as a person and as a golfer. Fortunately, the opportunity to continue playing golf is now sitting in my back pocket; it is now up to my work ethic and desire as to what I do with it." **What would you like to do (golf-wise) after graduation?** "At this point playing golf professionally is all I can think about. It would be hard to turn on a dream after putting this much time and effort into it."

2002-03: Played in all nine of Carolina's spring tournaments, posting four top-10 finishes...captured the ACC Championship...fired a five-under-par 211 total with rounds of 72-69-70 to post a two-stroke victory over Wake Forest's Bill Haas...marks the second consecutive year a Tar Heel has captured the conference title (Dustin Bray won in 2002)...tied for third place at The Intercollegiate after firing a six-under 65 in the second round for a four-under 209 total...also tied for third place at the Seminole Intercollegiate carding a six-under 210 total...tied for sixth place at the Schenkel E-Z-Go Invitational...was the low Tar Heel at the NCAA Championships where he tied for 22nd place...played in two B-team tournaments in the fall...captured individual championship at the Shootout at Burning Ridge carding a four-under par 140 total...finished in eighth place at the Greensboro College Invitational...selected the team's Most Improved Player and received the Ed Kenney Award which encompasses athletics, academics and attitude.

Up Close with Richard

How did you get started playing golf? "My Dad took me to the course when I was five or six years old. I watched him play and started to hit balls. It didn't take long to become passionate about the game." **What do you think about the spring season for yourself and the team?** "I feel we have a strong and deep lineup. If our short game improves, we should beat any team out there. I hope to get healthy again, so that I can practice and play. I am still suffering from a hand injury that occurred at last year's ACC Championship. That's why I didn't play this past fall." **What are you concentrating on in your individual game?** "My injury really prohibits me from working a lot on my game. I am concentrating on putting and the mental game." **What is your role on the team this year as a senior?** "Not being able to compete on the team (due to injury) limits my time and role on the team. Dustin is certainly taking the leadership role as one of the best college golfers in the country. As the academic team captain, I am trying to help the freshmen team members adjust to academic requirements in college and act as a contact person for them." **How do you think your game has grown while playing at UNC - what have you learned?** "During my time at UNC, my game has improved in every respect - technically, physically and mentally. I believe that in order to become a complete player, only having a good swing is not going to be enough. Therefore, I not only spend a lot of time on my swing and short game, but I also work out several times weekly and I've consulted with a sports psychologist." **What would you like to do (golf-wise) after graduation?** "I want to play professionally."

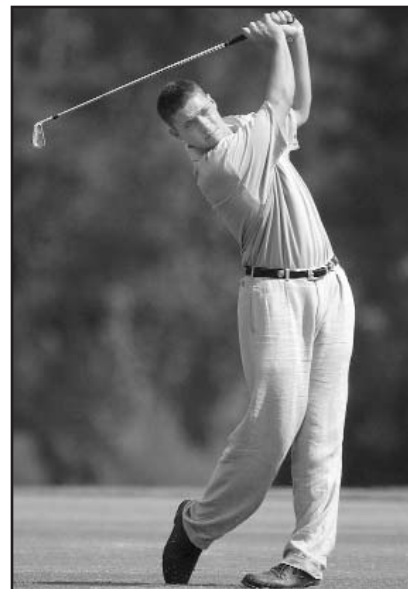

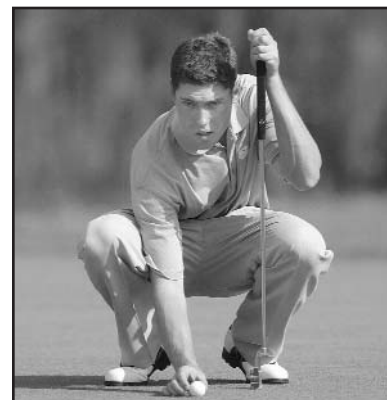

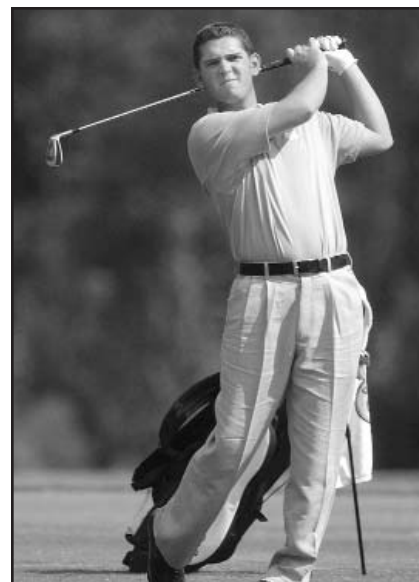

Head Coach John Inman



After spending 12 years playing on the PGA Tour, John Inman returned home—to his home state and to his alma mater. Now, in his sixth year at the helm, Inman brings years of playing experience and exuberant enthusiasm to the Tar Heel team.

“We’re very fortunate to get John Inman to return to Carolina as our men’s golf coach,” said UNC Director of Athletics Dick Baddour when

Inman was hired in 1998. “His knowledge of the game and experience on the PGA Tour should make him a tremendous teacher for our players. Plus, his reputation as one of the top players in NCAA history and the many contacts he has across the country will be a great benefit in recruiting. John knows the University and the UNC golf program and is committed to the goals and values of each.”

Inman, a native of Greensboro, N.C., and a 1984 graduate of Carolina, came to Chapel Hill from Roswell, Ga., where he lived for nine years while playing on the PGA Tour. Inman turned professional after he graduated from Carolina and played on the PGA Tour for 12 years (1987-1998). He won two tournaments during his pro career -- the 1987 Provident Classic and the 1993 Buick Southern Open. He posted eight top-10 finishes and 32 top-25 finishes.

“It’s an exciting opportunity to come back to Carolina and guide the program into the future,” said Inman when selected as UNC’s seventh head coach in history. “Carolina is one of the top academic institutions and with the renovations of Finley Golf Course and the new Chapman Center, it now has one of the finest facilities. It is thrilling to be a part of it.”

Inman, a three-time All-America (1982-84) and three-time All-ACC performer (1982-84), played on the Tar Heel team from 1981-84. He won the NCAA Individual Championship in 1984 and was the recipient of the 1984 Fred Haskins Award as the National Player of the Year. Inman’s score of 17-under-par in the NCAA Championship broke Texas’ Ben Crenshaw’s NCAA record by two strokes. That record, set at Houston’s Bear Creek Golf World, was tied three times before it was shattered in 2000 by Charles Howell of Oklahoma State who fired 23-under-par.

Inman, a member of the 1984 World Amateur Team and the 1984 Western Amateur Champion, won five tournaments while at Carolina. In addition to the 1984 NCAA Championship, he was the individual

medalist at the 1981 Methodist Invitational, the 1982 ACC Tournament, the 1982 Forest Hills Invitational and the 1983 Augusta College Invitational.

While Inman was a member of the Carolina team, the Tar Heels captured 15 team titles, including

three ACC championships (1981, 1983 and 1984). They participated in the NCAA Championship in all four of Inman’s years, posting three top-10 finishes. Carolina’s top NCAA finish during Inman’s career came in ‘84 when the team posted a fourth-place finish.

Since becoming head coach of the Tar Heels, Carolina has won eight team championships and five Tar Heels have captured 11 individual titles, including the ACC championships in 2002 and 2003. In addition, Carolina posted a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championship in 2003,

10th-place finishes in 1999 and 2000 and a 17th-place finish in 2002. Also, Dustin Bray became the winningest Tar Heel in school history under Inman’s tutelage.

While at Carolina, Inman has honed his game by competing in the New Zealand Open the last six years (1999-2004). He has carded four top-40 finishes including a tie for 13th place in 2004 and a tie for 38th place in 2002. With nine holes to play in the 2004 event, Inman pulled within two shots of the leader to become the top American finisher in the tournament. Inman has also played in several Buy.com and PGA Tour events since 1998.

Inman is married to the former Patti Arnold from Rochester, Mich. They reside in Durham.

Don Hill enters his first year as an assistant coach for the Tar Heels. His duties include assisting Head Coach John Inman in the day-to-day operations of the men's golf program in addition to his on-course duties as coach and teacher. Hill joins the men's golf program after working one year with UNC's Educational Foundation as a graduate intern. Prior to that, he played on golf mini tours, 1999-2001.

A 1999 graduate of the University of North Carolina, Hill was a member of the men's golf team (1995, 1997-99). He was a two-time All-ACC performer and two-time honorable mention All-America in 1998 and 1999. Hill helped lead Carolina to 10th-place NCAA finishes in 1997 and 1999. He was the runner-up at the 1998 ACC Championship, one stroke behind Clemson's Charles Warren, and finished 10th at the 1999 NCAA Championship. Hill posted 13 top-10 finishes during his four-year collegiate career and 23 top-25 finishes. He posted a 72.88 stroke average in 1997-98 and a 73.03 average in 1998-99.

"I'm extremely thrilled to have Don re-join our men's golf program," says Inman. "He was a senior on my first team here as a coach and represented our University extremely well as a player and will now do that as a coach. His playing ability will enhance his role as a teacher and he already has an innate ability to assess top talent."

Hill, from Mount Olive, N.C., and a four-year golf standout at Southern Wayne High School, graduated from Carolina with a degree in communications.

The Department seeks to contribute to the diversity of the University by offering opportunities for enhanced racial/ethnic, cultural and geographic representation.

To fulfill this mission, the Department, with the approval of the Board of Trust, has developed principles of operation to provide guidance and direction to its personnel. This Mission Statement and accompanying principles require strong dedication and commitment from all who participate in, coach in and support the Department of Athletics.

Department of Athletics Statement on Gambling

The mission of the Department of Athletics is to sponsor a broad-based athletic program that provides educational and athletic opportunities for young men and women to grow and develop. In the interest of fair competition and the growth and development of student-athletes, the Department strongly urges its friends and supporters to refrain from gambling/betting on contests involving collegiate competition and to abide by state and federal laws.
